Tree Peony Supplement to the Manual JOHN C. WISTER, Germantown, Pa.

I. INTRODUCTION

1. NEED OF, AND PURPOSE OF, NEW CHECK LIST

In 1924 I began work on the article which later was published under the title of "The Moutan Tree Peony" in the Peony Manual of 1928. Mr. E. H. Wilson, of the Arnold Aboretum, helped me particularly in tracing back the old literature of the subject. As far as I know, no one has since that time made any extensive search of the literature or published any lengthy article on the subject.

It is not necessary to more than mention here the fact that this long article is available in the Peony Manual. But I think it is well to emphasize that at the time of the publication of this article and the accompanying Check List and Color Classification, the only important Japanese nursery which was sending plants to this country was the Yokohama Nursery Company whose catalogues extended back to 1893. From this nursery and a few others that (like L. Boehmer, German nurseryman in Yokohama: the Tokio Nursery Co.; and the Japanese Nursery Co. in Settsu) were then (1928) apparently no longer in existence, had come all the commercial importations from 1890 to 1928.

The Check List in the Manual is totally out of date. The great majority of the varieties cited in it are now obsolete and many hundreds of new varieties have been introduced. It therefore is high time for the American Peony Society to publish a new Check List giving the names of all Tree Peonies of which there is record. marking clearly those now believed to be obsolete and giving as much information as possible about those varieties now in commerce or being grown in our gardens. By means of symbols even a single printed line can give quite complete information about a variety.

2. RECENT JAPANESE SOURCES OF TREE PEONIES Since the publication of the Manual the Yokohama Nursery Co. has apparently not sent any descriptive lists of Tree Peonies to this country, and its place has been taken by three new nurseries. The first and most important of these, the Chugai Company, sent out catalogues yearly from 1929 to 1940, offering many new varieties. All were of high quality and many of them were distinct improvements on the older kinds. Best of all they were true to catalogue descriptions, so that a variety could be reordered by name with assurance of getting the same thing and not one



or more different or inferior things. Japanese nurseries in the past had been conspicuously careless or dishonest in the labeling of plants. The Chugai Company apparently was the first Japanese peony nursery that was careful in its labeling. My own experience, coupled with my recent extensive correspondence with Tree Peony growers in various parts of the country, lead me to the conclusion that the Chugai varieties lead those of all other growers both in numbers and in quality.

In 1937 K. Wada sent out a handsome illustrated catalogue offering many new kinds. He followed this about two years later with an even larger and handsomer, but undated catalogue. I have not seen any of his plants and as far as I can learn he did not sell many plants in this country, probably because the Japanese were becoming unpopular. In 1939 Takii & Co. sent out a small list but as far as I have record sold plants to only one American grower.

In addition to these three nurserymen who published catalogues, several Japanese dealers offered plants from typewritten lists and shipped some plants to this country. Sakata and Yukika seem to have been the most important of these.

3. PRESENT STATUS OF THE TREE PEONY IN AMERICA

Before 1928 Bertrand H. Farr, R. L. Oberlin, and N. W. Kriek of Cottage Gardens, Lansing, Mich., had the largest commercial collections of Tree Peonies in this country, and Prof. A. P. Saunders, H. F. duPont. Mrs. W. K. DuPont and I had large amateur collections. The only public collection was that of Highland Park, Rochester, and it consisted only of seedlings, the named varieties having been lost many years before.

Today the largest commercial grower is probably R. L. Oberlin, who has about 7000 plants in over 100 varieties. As I have never had the opportunity of visiting Cottage Gardens I do not know how the Kriek Collection compares in size, but the catalogue does not offer so many varieties. The Farr Company does not offer as many varieties as it did five or ten years ago. Wayside Gardens offers some varieties, as do Bobbink & Atkins, and a few other nurseries. Prof. Saunders' commercial collection consists mainly of yellow hybrids of his own breeding. This is too small a group of growers to supply plants to this great country if the popularity of the Tree Peony is going to increase.

Today the largest public collection of named varieties is that of the Scott Horticultural Foundation of Swarthmore College. It contains about a thousand plants in over 200 varieties. Some named varieties are being grown now at the Brooklyn Botanic Garden, at the Arnold Arboretum, at the Whitnal Arboretum in Milwaukee, and at the Arboretum of the University of Washington in Seattle. Highland Park, Rochester, still has thousands of seedlings.

In addition to the above the following persons have collections of varying sizes today and have been kind enough to supply me with lists of their varieties, and thus to help me to verify just which varieties are being grown in American gardens today:

R. M. Carpenter, H. L. Collier, Coolidge Rare Plant Garden, A. M. Dewey, Wm. Gratwick, Charles Hammersley, Roy Hennesey, Edgar L. Kline, Clint McDade, Minnewashta Gardens, Morgan D. Reinbold, C. R. Runyan, O. B. Thorgrimson, and Josiah Whitnel.



I am most grateful to all of these for their help. I am grateful also to many others who were reputed to have named Tree Peonies and who at least helped me by denying that they had them.

My article in the Peony Manual was concerned only with the Moutan Tree Peony but the Check List included such yellow hybrids as were then in commerce. With the invasion of France, Lemoine's work of course ceased, and the only recent breeder of yellow hybrids has been Prof. Saunders. His work, which is of the greatest interest, may be only at its beginning, for he believes he is on the threshhold of yellow hybrids that bear fertile seeds, thereby making possible a second generation. Up to this time all the hybrids have been sterile.

4. JAPANESE NAMES: — PROBLEMS OF TRANSLITERATION AND TRANSLATION

In the Peony Manual I had little to say regarding the Japanese names of the varieties. In recent years I have been endeavoring to learn both how these names should best be spelled and what they mean. In many cases no one spelling can be said to be correct while others are incorrect. In transliteration the Japanese have used the letters of our language to give us (so they believe) the correct pronunciation of the Japanese name. Japanese is a strange and difficult language. It becomes more so in the process of transliteration. The sounds of "g" and "k." "j" and "sh," "z," "ts," "ds," "s" and "dz" are all much alike to the Japanese mind and are therefore used more or less interchangeably. Also they are sometimes changed to suit the context in a way in which we sometimes change an "a" to an "an" before a vowel. Some of these changes give us the varying uses of "gumo" and "kumo" indicating the word "cloud": "adzuma" and "azuma," for the word "east," and "jishi," "gishi" and "shishi" for the word "lion."

In many cases it is impossible to state exactly whether two names with very similar spelling are the same or distinct. This is the case with such names as Homai, Homei, Howmai and Howmei, for "o," "oh" and "ow" apparently may sometimes be the same and sometimes different. Correspondence more than five years ago elicted from the Chugai people such strange variations as the use of "tei" as "another pronunciation" of "Mikado" or of "gyoku" as "another pronunciation" of "tama." The use of the term "another pronunciation of" seems strange to us in these cases. It may be similar to the way we use the words, dawn and daybreak, or nightfall and evening.

I have tried to give the translation of as many Japanese names as has been possible with any degree of assurance. Some of these translations which have come directly from the Chugai or the Wada catalogues, or from Japanese botanists who were in this country before the outbreak of the war must be presumed to be correct. Even so there is a possibility of a variation of the meaning of such a name as Akashi-gata which can apparently be correctly translated as Shore of Akashi, or Inlet of Akashi. In other cases the names can be translated into meanings not so closely related, as for instance Ruriban, which may mean "Lapis Lazuli vessel." "Ultramarine basin." or "Indigo purple tray": Gumbow may mean "Throng of Beauties" or "Coveted by all." Gumpoden may mean "Temple adorned with Many Flowers" or "Palace of Many Beauties." There are names like Arashi-yama which means "Mt. Arashi," the name of a famous mountain, but as Arashi really means storm we could q



properly call it "Storm Mountain." After all we have a mountain on the Hudson river named Storm King, a name which a Japanese scholar would have difficulty explaining to his people.

It is likely that many of the names for which no translation has been found may be the names of insignificant villages or rivers near the homes of the raisers of the varieties. Kasumi-gaseki is translated as "Barrier of Mist" but it is also the name of a place which the Japanese may have used without thinking of the real meaning of the words any more than we think of the meaning of Los Angeles, of South Bend, or or Chestnut Hill.

It should be borne in mind also that many of the Japanese names of Tree Peonies really are not names at all in our sense of the meaning. They mean "white peony" or "red peony" or "dark peony": or "very fine" or "fine form." or other descriptive terms of that kind which may not necessarily apply to any one single variety or clon, but might quite properly be used for many different kinds. This is true of such names like Kuro-botan, which means dark peony or black peony. It seems reasonable to suppose that a number of Japanese nurseries might each have put the label of "dark peony" on one of their peonies and that we may have therefore imported a number of different things under that name. In other words it is not a clon name as botanists and horticulturists now use that term, but a descriptive name that could properly belong to anyone of many varieties.

5. COLOR CLASSIFICATION

A short color classification was given in the Peony Manual, and additions have appeared in the Bulletin. I have now included in the Alphabetical Check List a color abbreviation of many other varieties by guess work from their published descriptions. I use the term "guess work" because the Japanese understanding of what we mean by the terms pink, scarlet, or crimson is exceedingly confusing. When they say very light crimson they may mean a crimson, a scarlet, a rose pink or a pale pink, or even a white with crimson or purplish blotches. In spite of this it has seemed worthwhile to give color notes on as many varieties as possible, for it at least gives some basis by which we can divide the many named varieties into whites, pinks, reds or purples.

6. CONCLUDING REMARKS

This is an appropriate time to publish a new list. Our present unhappy feelings towards the Japanese make it seem desirable to some people to have American names to use on their plants instead of Japanese names, so it is well to have some translations on record which may prevent appearance of fanciful new names. The war has prevented any recent importations from either Europe or Japan, so that this list will remain more stable than in normal times. It is unlikely that any new varieties will come to us from abroad for the next five years or longer. When peace comes we shall be in no mood to buy plants from the Japanese, even if they have them to sell. They may have been plowed under to give more room for food crops. This is true also of the nurreries of France or Holland, none of which in the past ten or fifteen years have been as important to our Tree Peony collections in this country as they were in the first quarter of this century or before.



This list, like the former one in the Manual, is published with a full realization of its many shortcomings. When I think of these I feel somewhat cheered by Liberty Hyde Bailey's remark that he had never published anything without realizing its shortcomings or without wishing the very next week that he had waited a few more days to put in a few additional corrections. This list would never be published at all if I should wait in the hope of getting it all correct. I beg the members of the American Peony Society to help me by calling my attention to mistakes or omissions, or to things which they believe could be stated in a clearer way.

II. BOTANICAL CLASSIFICATION

To place the matter of botantical relationships in its proper perspective I present a classification adapted from Rehder's Manual and other botanists, of the species and their recognized botanical varieties, together with the names of the botanists who have discovered, described or introduced them.

Botanists distinguish Peonies with woody stems, as a sub-genus. They are believed to be more primitive and of greater age than the herbaceous Peonies.

& Secretary's Notes &

Early Wednesday morning, October 18, the phone rang and these few words were transmitted to me by the Telegraph Company, "John passed away this morning. Funeral Saturday 9 A.M." Stunned, I hung up the phone, made hasty preparations to send out numerous telegrams and letters advising the officers and directors of the Society that John A. Bongers, our newly elected President, had passed out of this life. Coming in such a short period of time from a similar report of the passing of Mr. A. B. Franklin, it was hard, indeed, to take this double blow of two of the best peony friends and boosters for our chosen flower to be taken from our midst.

Plans were hastily formulated for my departure for Ottumwa, Iowa, to be present at the last rites of our beloved President. A heart attack resulted in his death.

My association with him was more than a casual friendship. It had ripened into a deep appreciation of his many fine attributes: his deep love and affection for the peony: his earnest desire to perpetuate the love of the flower to his friends and acquaintances: to be ever willing and anxious to share some of his treasures in the flower world with others less fortunate in acquiring them, and in his extremely modest manner to preach the gospel of beauty through his flowers.

At our National Exhibitions, John was one of our outstanding contributors and exhibitors. If he did not win first awards, as he usually did, one never heard him question the judgment of those making the award. His ability to choose prize-winning blooms for the shows is well known to many. He was already formulating plans for next June when he proposed to make an extensive exhibition of bloom at Rockford, Ill., where the annual exhibition of the Society will be held, and I have no hesitancy in saying that some of the coveted awards would have been won with his displays.

I can visualize how pleased he would have been to conduct his first meeting next June and hear reports of progress that had been made during his administration. He was extremely modest and retiring and did not covet glamour of publicity, but in his quiet, unassuming, methodical way he made scores of friends — true, lasting friendships that pay dividends. His judgments and decisions were never made hurriedly or without premeditated thought and good sound reasoning. Please refer to BULLETIN 94 for a splendid likeness of John (as we were privileged to call him), and his splendid message. Let this stirring message stimulate you to higher aims for the Society and a desire to carry out his last request. It is a bitter parting, but we will always cherish the privilege we had of knowing him personally and intimately: of traveling the last mile to his final resting place, and of the good deeds he has accomplished in his comparatively short life.

John Anthony Bongers was born January 12, 1886, at Keokuk, Iowa. He came to Ottumwa, Iowa, with the family in 1894. After receiving his elementary education he was graduated from St. Ambrose Collection Entered the employ of the C. B. & Q. Ry. Co. in 1908 as a locomotifireman. In 1919 he was promoted to engineer and has served in the



capacity ever since. He was married in 1924 to Miss Ethel McGuire in Ottumwa. No children blessed this union. He was a member of St. Patrick's Catholic Church: a Fourth Degree K. of C.: the Elks Lodge and Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers.

He is survived by his wife, his mother. Mrs. Ida Bongers of Ottumwa. and the following brothers and sisters, Rev. Herman Bongers of Davenport, Iowa; Mrs. E. T. Collins, Des Moines, Iowa, Mrs. W. L. Runnells and Leo Bongers of Ottumwa, Iowa.

Due to the length of this BULLETIN our notes must necessarily be very brief. We do wish to explain to our members that this issue of the BULLETIN will bring the tree peony information in the manual up to date and this issue is intended to be a supplement to the Manual for this purpose.

The Society owes Mr. Wister a deep debt of gratitude for his contribution and for the great amount of work necessary to compile the information presented. We experienced considerable difficulty in getting a linotype company who were willing to do the work as desired, which has delayed the printing of the finished work. With BULLETIN No. 91 bringing the herbaceous peony information up to date and the publication of this BULLETIN, treating the tree peony in like manner, we feel the Society has done a real service to its members. Both Messrs. Wister and Peyton deserve our most sincere thanks.

The annual exhibition of the Society will be held in Rockford. Ill., in 1945 at a date to be announced shortly. Arrangements are already under way to make this an outstanding show, and the hearty co-operation of all peony growers is asked so this end may be attained. Mr. G. J. Boehland of Rockford, Ill., will be General Chairman and he will have working with him some real peony enthusiasts who promise a show worth crossing the Continent to see. Will have more details in the next issue of the BULLETIN, shortly to follow this issue.

The recent death of Mr. A. B. Franklin of Minneapolis, Minn., on September 25, will be sad news to many a peony lover. Mr. Franklin has done a great deal in his ever modest workings to make the standards of the peony the very highest, which is exemplified in many of his originations that are now in commerce. Tentative plans are now under way to produce a booklet covering his life and describing his originations in the peony field. Will have more detail on this later. Mr. Franklin was one of our outstanding originators and has many good ones to his credit. These fine peonies will ever keep his name fresh in the memories of ardent peony lovers, and those who have had the pleasure of meeting him personally can look back with pleasure to a privilege that was really worth while. The booklet will contain intimate stories of his life, written by friends who were close to him and knew him for his true worth as a lover of the beautiful. I am sure every peony lover will want a copy of this booklet when ready some time next spring.

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
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
